

## Call for papers from students and graduates for 2022 issue of NZJPH

Public history is the theory and practice of history in the world at large. It encompasses the variety of ways the past is produced and consumed in the present and is characterised by diverse audiences, modes and settings, methods that are often collaborative and interdisciplinary, and a focus on real-world issues.

The New Zealand Journal of Public History (NZJPH) is a quality assured (non-peer reviewed) electronic journal that publishes research articles, interviews and opinion pieces on the theory and practice of public history in Aotearoa New Zealand.

The journal was established at Waikato University in 2011, with Dr Nadia Gush as its primary editor. It is now hosted by the <u>Professional Historians' Association of New Zealand/Aotearoa (PHANZA)</u>.

It publishes research articles of 5000-6000 words and interviews and opinion pieces of 2000-3000 words. The inclusion of 2-3 images, with captions and credits, is encouraged.

Students and graduates are invited to submit abstracts (150-250 words) for the 2022 issue by the 31 December 2021.
