Te Pouhere Kōrero (www.tepouherekorero.org.nz) operates as a broad collective of Māori colleagues interested in history. It was established in November 1992, at an inaugural hui convened at Rongopai Marae near Gisborne, Aotearoa New Zealand. *Te Pouhere Kōrero – Māori History, Māori People* is our official journal, focusing on Māori and Indigenous history.

The first volume of the journal was published in 1999. All ten volumes have now been digitised (with support from Creative New Zealand and Te Kura Tangata Arts at the University of Auckland); they are available in the New Zealand History Collection (www.bwb.co.nz/collections), which can be found in all subscribing libraries (including public, tertiary and school libraries).
